Y.O.U. UPDATE

By now all of you church pastors should have received the packet of information on the talent contest, the photo contest, and next year's basketball tournament. We hope you are all as enthusiastic and excited about the program as we are here in Pasadena. We feel we have the greatest bunch of teenagers in the world and are striving to show them that we do appreciate them by providing an outlet with activities for them.

We have an exciting and varied program in mind — but it will only be a success to the degree you men support it. If you are enthusiastic about the program and show this to your congregations, your enthusiasm will catch on with members and teens. At the same time, however, if you are "cool" toward the program and disinterested, that too will be contagious. We would like to encourage any of you who don't particularly enjoy, or feel comfortable working with the youth, to appoint someone as youth coordinator who is enthusiastic and does enjoy working with them.

In the U.S. and Canada we have about 17,000 teenagers attending church. In fact, based on 1974 Festival attendance figures, over 46% of our total church attendance is under 20 years of age. This is an incredibly high percentage when compared to some churches, and should in itself answer the frequently asked question as to why we need a youth program.

Returns from Y.O.U. brochures which went out with Festival mailing have begun to come in. So far, we have received almost as much money in

general contributions from members who have no teenagers as we have in membership contributions. Many of the comments accompanying the general donations from members have been very encouraging. Such terms as "God-sent," "answer to prayer," "very badly needed," and "long-overdue," have frequently appeared. We will try to compile some of these comments and run them in the next issue.

One question that has come up several times regarding this brochure is whether or not teenagers can participate in more than one activity. The answer is that they can participate in as many activities as they feel they can handle.

Your comments would be welcomed or any questions you may have about the program. We appreciate your enthusiasm and support.

EMERGENCY FUND

Now that it has been over two years since the last update on the Emergency Fund, we would like to make a few comments and reminders concerning its use.

A central account is maintained at Headquarters, and each Church Pastor is issued a checkbook to be used in emergency situations to alleviate an immediate demand for payment in the local church area. The checkbook should not be considered solely as the "Emergency Fund" as in the past, but as an *instrument* provided to meet a broad range of contingencies of a financial nature in the conduct or performance of ministerial responsibilities.

The financial needs handled through the Emergency checkbook fall into three general categories:

1. Widow assistance (Third Tithes)
2. Assistance to individuals (Emergency Fund)
3. Urgent ministerial/church expenses

Expenses may be paid by using the Emergency checkbook *if* all of the following conditions are met:

1. The need cannot wait 10 or more days to receive payment from Pasadena. Note: Needs that can wait 10 or more days may be requested on a General Disbursement Voucher, by memo, or by calling on the WATS lines.
2. The check will alleviate an immediate demand for payment.
3. The expenditure is for
 - a. Member assistance, or
 - b. Urgent ministerial/church expense. Note: General or routine expenses should be paid by the Traveletter system or by using General Disbursement Vouchers or Hall Rental Vouchers.
4. The check is not payable to "Cash" or yourself.
5. Not more than \$300.00 is written to the same payee for the same purpose. (Exceptions must be approved by Headquarters and the approver's name noted on the Emergency Fund Expense Card.)

As with loans, no general assistance may be given to ministers in the employ of the Church without the approval of Mr. Cole or Messrs. McNair, Pyle, or Flatt.

Each month the Accounting Department produces an Exception Report (a listing of checks that have cleared the bank for which we have no corresponding expenses cards) which lists thousands of dollars of expenses that are unaccounted for. Never has it been below \$10-12,000, and it has risen to over \$50,000 on occasion. Try to picture the problems you would have if you didn't keep a check register of the expenses on your personal checking account. Then, multiply that problem by 200 times. That's the number of checkbooks we presently have in circulation. So please don't be delinquent in reporting Emergency Fund expenditures.

Since this is a multipurpose checking account, as checks clear the central account, funds are drawn out of the "General Account" and it is imperative that you send us the necessary backup and documentation which will enable us to make the necessary cost distribution into the various expense categories. This backup is then retained in our files as substantiation for the cancelled checks and is subject to IRS audits.

Thanks very much for your cooperation.

As mentioned in the last issue of the *Bulletin*, however, June was an above-average month for

To all ministers and key supervisory personnel in Christ's service:

GREETINGS!

By now I know you are all quite surprised (and I hope pleased!) by the sensational news you saw in the last issue of the WN. I am going to include with this Bulletin a memo I have written to all parties concerned clarifying our most exact present position regarding on-going considerations for the possibility of reopening the Bricket Wood campus so there will be no misunderstandings.

The most important single consideration is obviously monetary! The desire to open the campus is real enough; the very fact of the existence of the extensive and magnificent plant with all attendant facilities is, in itself, a constant reminder.

With one of the largest incoming freshman classes (approximately 300) in Pasadena, California, and with a large number of international students who COULD begin attending once again in Bricket Wood, plus the growing needs of the International Division, all indicate a definite decision in the affirmative!

However, as my memo will explain, there are many important considerations to be weighed -- the most important single one being that of budget.

Shortly after completing this Bulletin I will be en route for a quick trip to our Bricket Wood campus, together with Frank Brown, Ronald Dart, Les McCullough, and Art Ferdig -- all of whom will be engaged in meetings with various of our personnel on the British campus.

I expect to be in Denver, God willing, for the Sabbath tomorrow (I'm writing this on Friday, the 25th of July) for combined Sabbath services and a dance/singalong on Saturday night. I really enjoy and look forward very much to getting out to some of the local churches on an occasion such as this when it is possible.

I notice a number of letters are beginning to come in expressing appreciation for the new series of broadcasts on the Gospels. I am interspersing programs of a more newsy nature (such as a couple of recent ones concerning the upcoming Helsinki conference and the signing of a resolution in the context of the European Security Conference, which, in effect, grants the Soviet leadership its more than 30-year-

old desire to in effect recognize the permanence of the divided condition of Europe, and especially a divided Germany, which is tantamount to achieving a peace treaty with West Germany after 30 years!). But during most of the programs I am wading through the scriptures verse by verse as I used to many years ago.

I certainly hope that this gradually builds up a solid audience, and that many people are being given in-depth biblical understanding as a result of listening to the series on the Gospels. I will be watching very carefully not only our own mail, but in the future checking on station ratings with our agency to determine whether this new-type programming (beginning a whole new Bible series, and slowly wading through the scriptures on the air) is really a successful format.

Also, we are buying one-minute spots in a selected number of network stations, which I am to do yet this afternoon -- so it is going to be a busy day!


I hope all of you fellows and your families are well and happy in God's Work -- and that you are keeping up your zeal and enthusiasm for the Work of God and for the service to the flock over which God has placed you; that you are remembering the admonitions of the Apostle Paul to the young evangelist Timothy of the many problems both from without and within -- and that you are remaining **STRONG** and firm in the faith, preaching sound doctrine and solid scriptural "meat" to your congregations, insuring that they are constantly growing on a solid, stable diet of spiritual food!

MEMORANDUM

To: All Concerned

Date: July 24, 1975

Subject: Reopening of Bricket Wood

From: Garner Ted Armstrong

By now you all know I have been entertaining ideas of reopening the British campus as soon as possible.

However, to avoid any misunderstandings or false assumptions, I thought it wise to send all interested parties a memorandum on the subject.

1) I am hoping to be able to reopen the British campus without any increase in allocation from the United States, meaning our present financial policy of sending no further monthly allocation beyond January 1, 1976, remains in effect, and any funds other than indigenous British income needed for the maintenance of a small academic complex would have to come in the form of travel subsidies, scholarships or by other means from the various offices of the International Division, as well as a grant from the newly-formed Ambassador International Cultural Foundation.

2) No one should interpret the reopening of the British campus as some "massive leap ahead" in THE WORK in England. The reopening of the academic complex is contemplated as precisely that -- a group of students on campus for the purpose of studying toward their respective degrees with the hope that some few (and it would be unwise to speculate on what percentage, since both the needs of the Work and the dictates of budget would arbitrate) might eventually be drafted into the International Division of God's Work.

THE WORK in Britain would be largely unaffected. By that I mean to say that all activities connected with the preaching of the Gospel of the Kingdom as a witness would remain precisely as they are, with the Plain Truth's printing, circulation, newsstand program; activities of church administration, including lectures and maintenance of churches and Bible studies, remaining precisely as they are and being unaffected directly by the possible reopening of the academic complex.

In these early stages of a "financial feasibility study," it would be precipitous to conclude the reopening of the campus is even possible this fall, in the coming winter term, or even sooner than the autumn of 1976. Present conditions in Britain -- with continuing runaway inflation, the many government and political problems (British newspapers are heavily laced with talks of strike), plus the total income picture for God's Work around the world as a whole -- will all weigh heavily, not only in the decision whether to reopen the academic complex in Bricket Wood at all, but IF it is reopened, WHEN.

Only after I have complete information concerning the possibility of travel subsidies, scholarships or other sources of revenue which can meet the projected requirements of a full faculty, staff, and student body of 120 students (an arbitrary figure which need not be considered final), can I really know whether or when the British campus can be reopened.

I would appreciate any input, especially in the form of written memoranda from any concerned which might prove helpful as a part of our feasibility study prior to a final decision concerning whether and when to reopen the British campus.

International Division

EUROPEAN TRIP

(Telexed from London)

Well, greetings again to all of you from London. Don't believe everything you hear about English weather. We have been here and in Europe for three weeks now and have had some of the best California weather imaginable. Bright sunshine, clear and around 80 degrees has been the order of the day all the time.

Wayne Cole and I had a ministerial meeting with everyone here June 23 through 26. Mr. Hunting and all of those I have spoken with feel it was most helpful and hope we can do something similar once or twice a year.

We had around 50 to 60 in attendance including the men from the Continent, two of whom spoke no English. But with the help of their fellow ministers, who interpreted as we spoke, they were able to get along very well and generally were able to understand what was going on. We covered general topics just as Wayne and I have been doing in other conferences.

Following the meetings, Steve Martin and I had a few days of work meetings with Mr. Hunting and Staff. It is not secret that the budgetary reductions made here have created some problems. But I am happy to say that some very encouraging steps have been made. The campaigns here in Great Britain have been very well received and several new churches have been started. Even so with the closure of the college, we have been a little over staffed. In order to help the budget as well as fill some needs in other areas, we are transferring six of the men to other areas.

Dennis Luker has been needing some additional manpower in Australia. Therefore we are returning two Australians to him. They are Mr. and Mrs. Colin Sutcliffe and Mr. and Mrs. Peter McLean. Both are graduates of Bricket Wood and have been serving in the ministry for some time. Colin was head of the Agriculture program but was sent into the field ministry with the closing of the College. Peter is a local elder and has been serving in Liverpool.

Bob Morton is going to be coming to Pasadena for a semester of college and then be returning to his home area to be assigned either in Australia or New Zealand.

David Stirk, Ron Stoddart and Davie Hume are going to help out in the South African work. Bob Fahey needs the help and has the budget, so they can be a big asset to him and the Work doesn't lose their experience.

On July 1, Marion and I flew to Brussels, while Steve visited the Church in southern Ireland. We only spent one day with Ray Kosanke but were able to go through E.E.C. buildings and get a feel of that hub of European activity. While there we enjoyed the hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. Carion. He is self-employed but handles the French Language Church in Brussels. It was a very pleasant evening and they have a most beautiful home. Fortunately he spoke English, although Mrs. Carion didn't. We flew from Brussels to Copenhagen where we joined Stuart Powell. He has been working with the Scandinavian Churches for eighteen months or so.

I had the privilege of conducting services at one of the members' homes on the Sabbath. The next morning we flew to Oslo, Norway and conducted services there. Then the following day drove to Sanderstolen where the Scandinavian Feast is held. If anyone has the financial ability, I would strongly recommend it for the Feast. It is an absolutely beautiful area. The next day we flew to Stockholm and that evening had a Bible study with about 20 people in the hotel room. We had one man present who was baptized last year in Pasadena after travelling all the way there from Finland. Obviously he doesn't get to many of the services and greatly appreciated this one.

All in all we saw roughly 100 people between the three services. I had the chance to explain the *Human Potential* and A.I.C.F. to them. In every case they were very enthusiastic. We were also able to report that the Scandinavian area has about a 65 percent increase in income over last year.

We hope to be able to move Stuart Powell and his family to Oslo later this year. As it now stands, he is the pastor of two Churches here in the London area and takes the long trip through Scandinavia every few weeks. There is not time to visit new prospectives or even church members for that matter. We feel that by the first of the year at the latest he can devote full time to the Scandinavian area and more real growth will be coming as a result.

From Stockholm we flew to Bonn, Germany and spent some time with Frank Schnee. All is well there. All of the employees are now relocated in Bonn and everyone else feels it has been an excellent move.

Tomorrow we go home and will that ever be

good. There is simply nothing like your own bed. At the same time, there is nothing like the opportunity to talk and work with these men and the Church members face to face. So much more can be accomplished in the hours of talk than ever could by letters. Just let me say fellows, I deeply appreciate the work you are all doing and especially the willing sacrifices some of you make in this Work we're all a part of. . . . Thanks, until next time.

CANADIAN WORK UPDATE

Greetings from the Canadian branch of God's Work!

There are many areas of activity and growth in the Canadian Work. I'll try to put them in logical order to help keep you abreast of what is going on in the following vignettes put together by our Office Manager, Don Miller.

Vancouver Office

Facilities: Following the release of the auditorium space, some offices and remodeling of the area retained, we have 5,200 sq. ft. of office space and lounge with 4,800 sq. ft. of warehouse. The facilities will accommodate our needs for any foreseeable growth in the next 4-5 years. There are suitable private offices and work locations for the staff, and overall work conditions will have been improved by the recent changes.

Staff: The work force is made up of 28 full-time and 3 part-time employees. This is down from 1974's high of 38 full-time people. The reorganization of the staff last summer, and continuing adjustments of individual efforts and duties has provided the office with a closer, and better oriented staff for getting the job done.

Data Processing: The IBM Visual Display System (terminals) are on order and we're hoping to be "on line" with the resident files in Pasadena by January 1st. By being able to handle our own file maintenance we'll greatly facilitate taking care of our list for Canada. The terminal system will afford us, at some later date, the ability to place other applications of our mail handling, receipting and financial information on the computerized format and without large outlays of money.

Income: Running comfortably at a 20% increase over last year and as this budget year draws to a close, we anticipate 1975-76 to be about as good. All indicators point to another good year.

Members continue to carry the bulk of the load giving 63% of mail income and 69% of overall

income. Co-Workers now number about 9,000 and represent 25%, with donor contributions making up the remaining 6 percent.

Mail: The overall mail count has been down all year — a strange phenomenon as everything else has been up. This is partly due to closer and more immediate contact in the field and a remote possibility that a degree of saturation of effort is beginning to set in.

During the fiscal year we will have processed some 103,000 donation letters, 40,000 ad responses, 71,000 reply mail cards or circulars along with some 90,000 pieces of white mail for a total of 304,000 letters.

Printing: With 6 months behind us now each printing and circulation of the PT gets easier. The copy is received from HQ and is on the press within 24 hours of the U.S. copies and into the mail bags at the post office within 72 hours. This coupled with shorter delivery time, as it originates in Canada, the list benefits from earlier delivery dates by 5 to 6 days.

We have our printing expense down to \$.034 per copy and once our second class mailing permit is approved, we'll cut our postage expense by 50 percent. Now that our files have the Canadian postal code on it, we're proceeding with the filing on our 2nd class permit and should have Ottawa's ruling by the end of the summer.

Circulation: Presently our file totals are: English PT 180,000; French PV 58,000; GN 17,000; CC 3,600; Co-Worker/Member mailings 12,500.

Public Displays

We thought you might appreciate a rundown on the fairs we have conducted so far, including a few statistics on the most successful ones. Up to now we have received requests from 44 different areas for public display supplies (PT's, booklets, etc.). In some of these areas more than one fair is planned — or has already taken place. For these 44 fairs, we have sent 42,000 PT's and PV's. Some of the most successful have been:

Quebec City International Book Fair — 2,059 PV's taken; 315 lit requests.

Quebec City "Salon De La Femme" — 2,500 PV's taken; 400 lit requests.

Windsor Home/Sport Show — 329 PT's taken; 67 lit requests.

Chatham Fair — 271 PT's taken; 131 lit requests.

Spring Bible Lectures

Here is a summary of the spring Bible Lectures for 1975 (mostly in large cities and areas where

they know we have established Churches, hence a small percentage of people attending):

WATS Helps Out

Though mail may be showing a seasonal decline, the WATS line is holding its own quite well. The response to the telecast concerning Animal Oddities has been better than average. As is usually the case with this type of program, many calls were from children. As of July 21, over 31,700 registries have been received for the month.

A.I.C.F. AND THE UNITED NATIONS

I was happy to see the positive comments in the Open Forum regarding AICF.

In some ways I compare it to a United Nations that will *succeed!* It is interesting to note that the UN was established to bring world peace and provide humanitarian aid. Progress towards these goals *will* be achieved by the AICF.

The *Human Potential* magazine will serve as a "General Assembly." World leaders will make their contributions, and so will the leaders of God's Church. Thus the knowledge of many will be heard. Most important of all is the knowledge of peace that will be heard.

Another comparison with the UN can be detected between the founders. Thirty years ago the United States (Physical Israel) was the primary instrument in organizing the UN through its initiative, use of land, and finances. Today the Church (Spiritual Israel) is the primary instrument in organizing the AICF through similar channels.

At this point, I want to stop my comparisons and present a departure. Whereas the U.S. has lost influence in the UN; I feel the Church will gain influence through the AICF. Not only that, but the message of world peace will become the reality!

UNIQUE FACTORS IN OUR COUNSELLING

Recently we have had quite a number of tapes and M.E.T. articles on the art or techniques of

counselling. Many of the points raised have broadened our appreciation of the subject.

In order to see what was being offered on the subject here, I approached our local university to put a course on for lay counsellors. Quite a number of people enrolled — they included nurses, social workers, union leaders, ministers, etc. It was interesting to hear the various views expressed and the type of work each is involved in.

From the lectures I noted a few observations. The first one was prompted by a lecture given by a clinical psychologist in charge of a government-run community health agency. He said the trend today is away from specialization in counselling to the generalist. And some of the most successful counsellors are lay counsellors. Why? Because they have a natural rapport with people. Many non people-oriented types carefully study techniques of handling people but still just don't have what it takes. He added that the more people learn techniques of counselling the greater the inherent danger of sacrificing their naturalness to the artificiality of a technique. They become technique oriented rather than people oriented and this creates a stilted encounter. Our greatest asset as counsellors is our open naturalness and our enjoyment of people. If we haven't got this, no technique will make up for it.

Another observation I made at these lectures was the fact that most counselling techniques are based on building an empathy between the counsellor and counsellee. Carl Rodgers is virtually the high priest of empathy with his client-centered approach. But one thing we should never forget is that the majority of people we counsel with have God's Spirit. That means we are of one mind — one attitude — and have as brothers in Christ an immediate empathy. Our client comes to us not as a stranger, but as a brother who wants us to help him to achieve our common goal — the Kingdom of God. Most counsellors in the world are dealing with strangers who do not share the same overall goal or the same value system. This leads to my third point.

We live in a purposeless world without any absolutes. Counsellors basically are directionless in the sense they can't impose their values (which after all are only one man's opinion) onto the behaviour of their client. They merely guide the person to see clearly his choices and his responsi-

bility to make a decision. Of course this is what we are to do too, but in all this there is no authority or absoluteness brought in with their counselling. We do have absolutes and authority behind us — which of course is the Word of God. Our people come to us because we are to be teachers of God's law — which is our wisdom and our understanding.

We do need to realize that there are unique factors in our counselling. It is important not to underestimate the good will that exists between members of God's Church and their minister. They come voluntarily to us because we are helpers of their joy. In the world, many counselling situations are referrals from one stranger to another, sometimes with the idea of getting "this fellow" to conform to society's concept of normality. Therefore a more stilted, defensive environment is generated.

I hope this has been helpful to show that our counselling does differ from much of the counselling given by psychologists or psychiatrists in our society.

BOOK REVIEW

Liberal Christianity at the Crossroads

by John B. Cobb, Jr.

The Westminster Press, Philadelphia (1973) \$4.95

Most of us would more or less automatically condemn the view of anyone who claimed to be a *liberal* Christian. Most of us would associate liberalism with permissiveness, licentiousness, hedonism and social activism. Only the last term is truly appropriate however.

John B. Cobb is one of the leading thinkers in modern liberal Protestantism. He is well respected in the world of theology — and not without good reason. He has an incisive way of getting at the core of things. I found his book to be philosophically stimulating, thought-provoking and enlightening. I don't agree with every view espoused in this book — but it did help me to see the flip side of the coin. Cobb is an intensely moral, conscientious individual — if his writing is a true reflection of his character. Here are some of the more piquant quotes:

"But there is another difficulty about this liberal Christian life. It is also exhausting. Constant self-criticism alone cannot constitute our existence. None of us is strong enough for that." (page 15)

Quoting Reinhold Niebuhr he writes: "... the function of preaching is to afflict the comfortable and to comfort the afflicted." (page 15)

That's a beauty!

On page 32 Cobb observes: "Men are capable of endless self-deception, so that the emergence of every ideal becomes an occasion for hypocrisy. Those who pursue truth most vigorously and those who love justice most passionately often become most cynical."

Cobb's formula for producing catastrophe is indeed valid: "... to produce catastrophes we need only to continue to think and act as we now think and act."

This is true of all of our self-destructive modern society. It's the very heart and core of our message!

The book contains many other profound thoughts and observations. Cobb has the moral courage to be self-critical of the liberal view. He plainly shows its weaknesses while insisting that it shore up its strengths.

I'm sure we can all learn and be challenged by this important volume and I hope the above quotes will stir your interest so that you will want to go out and obtain a copy. Cobb is Ingraham Professor of Theology at Claremont University here in California.
