GRADUATION HI-LITE OF EXPANDING WORK

June 8, 1962—The most inspiring Ambassador College graduation ever! Climaxing a week of great strides in God's Work, the 12th annual commencement exercises produced two notable firsts—the largest graduating class ever in the history of the college, and the first doctorate degree ever awarded at Ambassador.

After an inspiring commencement address by Vice President Armstrong, in which he outlines graphically the seven major differences between the Ambassador Colleges and all other institutions, the Degree of Bachelor of Arts was conferred upon 42 candidates—twelve more than the previously largest class of 1960.

Following this presentation, the Degree of Master of Arts in Theology was conferred upon Mr. Dibar Apartian and Mr. Leroy Neff. Then, in conclusion, something the audience had been anxiously awaiting, the Degree of Doctor of Theology was presented to Mr. Herman Hoeh.

BIBLE STORY BOOK EXPLODES RECORDS

The initial response for Volume II of the BIBLE STORY has been fantastic! Mail receipts have exploded! Existing records for both letters and money were wiped out by an avalanche of mail that threw the Mail Receiving Department tens of thousands of letters behind! Other departments began volunteering assistance to help them dig out!

A record week of 65,395 letters totally eclipsed the old mark of 34,266 set in May 1961! The old week-day high of 6,176 went by the wayside on Monday, June 18, when 16,767 letters poured into the office! A record month is also in the making with a possible 160,000 letters!

A new financial high for a single week was set on two consecutive weeks!

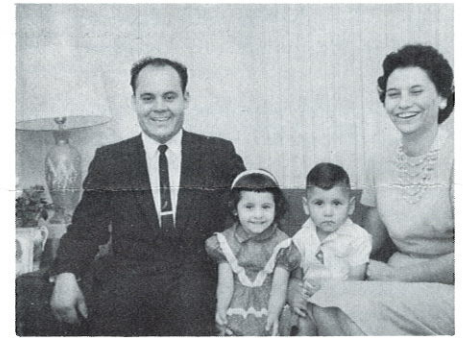
VISITORS:
